5/8 missing children found in Butler/Warren Counties; Montgomery County, 8/8.

A new round of posters planned for March.

We have found out about a trafficking exhibit at the Underground Freedom Center in Cincinnati. We are hoping to get our club interested in taking a trip to see it. After our committee meeting next week, we will be ready with details at the meeting the 13th .

A TRIP TO MOTEL X

As Ann, Barb, Beth and I entered the motel room exhibit, we were immediately surrounded by the menacing atmosphere created by low red and black lights and graffiti on the wall.

First, we saw a closet with a few suggestive outfits hanging and a floor filled with dirty looking shoes, tees, jeans and papers.

The central focus of the room is the bed. It has the words, "The trafficker makes the victim fall in love with him" embroidered on the pretty coverlet. Under the quilt, the ways this is done are described on more words embroidered on material.

All four of us smiled for a picture as we entered the display, but any pleasant feelings were quickly replaced by mesmerizing sadness as we watched a ballet playing on the TV. It is a violent, disparate dance of the attraction between a man and a woman that captures the power vs. powerlessness in this type of hateful relationship. In this room, there is also a nightstand with drawers that light up with red light when opened. One held notes from victims to read; another items labeled with things taken from victims like innocence and hope.

The bathroom holds a medicine cabinet with the most common types of work for labor trafficking victims written on pill and mouthwash bottles - domestic,

construction, etc. The bathtub contained a life sized wire sculpture of a young lady chained in place. A cleaning cart had its bottles labelled with ways to identify trafficked victims.

The rest of the Underground Freedom Center is devoted to all types of slavery and human bondage both present and past. We learned so much as we toured and talked. It renewed our commitment to do what we can to stop human trafficking.

TREASURER INFORMATION

Here is some information Sue shared.

Ohio Nonprofit COVID-19 Survey

The Ohio Attorney General's Office, Philanthropy Ohio, and The Ohio State University are partnering to administer the Ohio Nonprofit COVID-19 Survey intended to understand the greatest needs of Ohio's nonprofit sector during the COVID-19 pandemic. As the club member registered to file our annual Ohio Charitable Report, the voluntary survey was emailed to my attention.

The data from the short ten minute survey will be used to inform policymakers, funders, media, and other decision makers about how to best support the non-profit sector during this time, as well as for research purposes. They plan to follow up with us in the coming months to ask for updates, so that they can monitor the situation over the long run.

While not all questions and situations applied to our organization, my answers communicated these primary impacts due to social distancing restrictions.

- We will have to significantly modify our fundraising initiatives which may put our revenue results at risk.
- The economic impact of COVID-19 will decrease the pool of public donations to be shared among an increasing number of charitable causes.
- Our ability to grow our membership will be challenged due to meeting size and location limitations, as well economic downturn.

It was encouraging to see the state's focus on the important role of non-profit organizations. Our club's efforts to plan ahead and adopt creative changes to get the job done will help make it a fun and successful year!

American Legion Auxiliary Buckeye Girls State Cancelled for 2020

Our club has been notified that the Buckeye Girls State Program scheduled for June 14-20, 2020 on the campus of the University of Mount Union, Alliance, Ohio has been cancelled due to COVID-19.

This national program which is part of the American Legion Auxiliary's Americanism program helps mold high school girls to be our country's leaders of tomorrow. Delegates learn more about City, County and State Government in one week than they will learn in an entire semester of high school. Once again, our club sponsored a delegate for \$275 which includes housing, food and the government activities.

Our local American Legion Auxiliary Unit has asked us to consider allowing them to hold our donation for the 2021 program. We have agreed to do this, and will utilize those funds for 2021 toward one of our other programs.



VIRGINIA WAGNER AWARD

We all know about the Virginia Wagner Award that our chapter awards every vear to a young woman in our community. This award honors the effort and scholarship of a woman attending a college or university to earn baccalaureate, masters, or doctoral degree. Judging at the club, district and region level is conducted by three non-Soroptimist judges who utilize standardized scoring sheet for each applicant; judging is based on effort education toward (35%).impression (20%), scholarship (15%), extra-curricular activities (15%), and need (15%). Winning applications at the club level advance to the district level for judging; winning applications at the district level advance as high as the region level for judging.

Our Club has been awarding \$1,500 to the Club's winner and those funds come out of our Service Funds. The four District winners are awarded \$1,000 each and the Region winner of the "Virginia M. Wagner Educational Grant" is awarded \$2,500 at Spring Conference. These funds all come out of the Midwestern Region's funds.

But does everyone know the history behind the award? Each of the Soroptimist Regions selects and supports a specific region project. In 1972, the Midwestern Region

established the "Region Award Project" to be given annually to a woman who college/university attending was further her education to provide 2004 advancement. At the Spring Conference, the name of the award was changed from the "RAP" award to the "Virginia M. Wagner Educational Grant" in honor of Dr. Virginia M. Wagner, MWR Governor 1982-1984, to commemorate her interest in higher education for women.

Years ago, the Award was funded by collecting \$2 from every member in the Midwestern Region every year as part of their MWR Dues. I found a dues statement from 2001/2002 for the Cincinnati Club and it listed \$2 for the Region Award Program. History of the funding gets a bit hazy here with no one sure what changes were made in the following years. In 2017 Kris Armstrong (our immediate-past governor) came up with an idea of establishing the Acorn Guild (donation of \$100) to secure funding for the Wagner Award. thought this capital campaign could create a large nest egg. It was designed as a three-year program to raise \$100,000. The hope was that 350 people would donate \$100/year for three years. By investing those funds, we could build a way to fund the award. Kris then came up with the Hildy & The Acorn Guild title/theme Midwesterners are а hardy and prepared bunch who save up for winter. Hence the squirrel and acorns. The is from Hildv reference Wagner/Valkyries/Brunhilde which apparently has something to do with handmaidens in Norse mythology, about which I don't have a clue.

Kris' intent was that the necessary funds would be raised by the end of this

biennial which ends July 1, 2020. Those funds have not been raised and the new Board will be discussing it at their future Board Meetings.

So here is something to think about, if you are looking for a very worthy program to donate to, The Virginia Wagner Award should be on your list. Where SIA has the Laurel Society to fund the various programs and awards they give out, "membership" starts at \$1,000. Membership in the Acorn Guild starts at only \$100. Stay tuned for updates on the Acorn Guild - or whatever replaces it for funding the VWA. Many of our Club winners have gone on to be District and Region winners. If we don't support/donate to the VWA we will be limiting our Club winners when they move on to the next level.
