Hope House Center for Women and Children Update

January was a busy month. Four baskets filled with towels, toiletries, cleaning supplies, a shower curtain and rings, a small trash can, a bucket, a mop and a broom were delivered to the new Director, Tammi Ector, at the Women's Center. She was very pleased with our efforts and took pictures. She called me several days later and asked if it was OK to put a story about our program in their monthly newsletter. Of course, I said yes and ask her to send it to me so we could also try to get it in the Journal News. She said the ladies loved the baskets and that she felt they would be a real incentive for some of the ladies

to work harder toward their independence.

I appreciate everyone's willingness to make a \$20 donation toward this project. That along with the \$600 you approved at the last meeting will allow us to supply the Center with 20 baskets. Hopefully that will be enough to get them through the summer I hope we will have the months. budget for this project to continue into next year. Most of the supplies to complete the remaining baskets have been purchased. I added 12 hangers to the next 3 baskets which will be delivered this week. If you have some plastic or wooden hangers (not wire) that you could donate, bring them our February meeting please.

We are also providing our quarterly meal for the Center residents this week. With all this cold weather, what better time to have a hot soup and salad supper? Thanks to Gayle, Marti, Judy, Jo, and Beth for joining me in preparing and taking this dinner to the women and children there. Our soup menu will include home-made chicken noodle, vegetable beef, and chili. The Center can house 40 residents and we are anticipating a full house with such cold weather. Last time we served in October, we had 40 residents and 4 working staff members. Our next dinner will be in April, maybe the 18th?? so if you can, please let me know if you are willing to be on the April team.

STOP TRAFFICKING

So far, getting our group of 10 members organized and involved with the local efforts of non-profits to stop human trafficking has been going well. As I reported earlier, the latest poster of 8 local missing children has helped locate 6 so far. How exciting is that?

The coordinator of these efforts, Susan Gruenberg, came to Java Johnny's last week to help explain some of the techniques and steps necessary to successfully deliver materials to local businesses. The goal of those involved is to find places with public restrooms, deliver the wanted posters for the employees' break room and put the stickers on the back of women's stall room doors. After our initial contact and organization, there will be new materials to deliver every 4 months.

In just our first brainstorming session, we have identified 100+ places in the Middletown area that we would eventually like to work with. We are meeting next week to decide which business we want to target first. We are hoping to do our first distribution with materials at the end of February.

Susan has arranged for one of her speakers to come and talk to our whole group for our May program. This person will be able to educate all of us in ways to identify possible victims of trafficking.

Tammi described her fall into the "D" stories, divorce, depression, drug abuse, dysfunction and despair. She then found, through what she feels is intervention. divine degrees and daycare and now Hope House for director. She definitely can Women relate to the women she helps.

Tammy explained that the shelter is the access point for four counties and has an intake procedure to determine whether to shelter or divert. Hope House for Women is funded to serve all counties, not solely Middletown. Women must come on their own volition no matter where the referral comes from. They are provided with counseling and classes. And Hope House is always there to help these woman, even after release.

For our part, the baskets we provide help the shelter provide accountability to women. There are certain regulations and goals that must be reached, and if they are, the baskets are a reward for their success.

It is great to help women get a new start, and we appreciate Tammi's role in managing our donations. Jennie
